Martin Luther King Day Lakasie Vieria Form 4-2

Dr. Martin Luther King, a black American, was born in 1929 in Atlanta. Although slavery was abolished in the USA in 1862, some white people were still discriminating against the blacks. The blacks had to suffer humiliation at every step. Martin Luther opposed this strongly. He travelled throughout the United States of America and abroad, lecturing and meeting civil and religious leaders. He wanted to complete the unfinished work of Abraham Lincoln. He followed the path of non-violence shown by Mahatma Gandhi. He became the leader of black Americans. The blacks started a peaceful movement to be treated as equals of the whites. His movement became very popular. In 1964 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. He, too, was assassinated like Mahatma Gandhi. He was not even 40 years old at that time.

Martin Luther King Jr. lost his life trying to better the lives of African-American people. He was one of the greatest American Civil Rights leaders of the 1960s. He was born in the city of Atlanta, Georgia. His father was a minister at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta. At fifteen Martin Luther King Jr. was enrolled at Morehouse College. He graduated from there in 1948, and, like his father wanted to become a minister.

Martin Luther King Jr. married Corretta Scott in 1953 while doing graduate work at Boston Graduate School. They had four children. In 1955, he completed his work at Boston Graduate School and got his PHD. By this time Martin Luther King Jr. was a well-known Civil Rights Activist who was attempting to get rid of discrimination and to overthrow the unfair segregation laws in the South.

In 1956, a bomb was thrown on to the porch of Martin Luther King Jr's house. Again in 1956, another bomb was thrown onto his porch, luckily both times the bombs did not explode. In 1956, King was also arrested on charges of hindering the operation of buses without permission or legal cause. In 1958, he published a book called "Stride toward Freedom: The Montgomery Story". In 1960, King moved to Atlanta with his family and became the copastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church, his father's old church. In 1962, Martin Luther King Jr. was convicted of leading a march to Albany.

He made a famous speech that is known as the "I have a Dream" speech. That speech was an inspiration to millions of African-American people. Martin Luther King Jr. led a protest against segregated buses. It started when an older lady named Rosa Parks, who is now famous for not giving up her seat, was arrested. Martin Luther King Jr. was a very powerful speaker. He knew how to lead protests, and how to get people involved. He is the main reason for the equal rights between races that we have today. King was elected the leader of a group called the Montgomery Improvement Association. After the protests started by the Rosa Parks issue, Martin Luther King Jr. encouraged others to boycott the segregated buses also. After the protests ended, angry white people tried to kill Martin Luther King Jr., by bombing his house. The attempts were unsuccessful.

To make the battle against nonviolence stronger, Martin Luther King Jr. and many other African-American ministers formed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. During the sixties, young African-American College boys started sitting at the "white" tables. The protests were broken up by the southern police, who used police dogs and fire hoses. The violence and drama of the protests was shown on television and President Kennedy proposed a bill to deal with this at Congress. Soon after the segregation laws were withdrawn.

In 1968, Martin Luther King Jr. was killed after he had finished giving his last speech in Memphis, Tennessee, called "I've been to the mountain top," in front of a huge crowd. An escaped convict, named James Earl Ray shot him, as he was standing on the balcony of his hotel room. The speech was for striking African-American garbage men. He died on April 4, 1968. The assassin was convicted and sentenced to ninety-nine years in jail. Today, in January on his birthday, we have a the national holiday to celebrate his work called Martin Luther King Day . His last words were: "Take my hand precious Lord.' Truly a man for the ages.

Goal setting is a powerful process for thinking about your ideal future, and for motivating yourself to turn your vision of this future into reality. The process of setting goals helps you choose where you want to go in life. By knowing precisely what you want to achieve, you know where you have to concentrate your efforts. You'll also quickly spot the distractions that can, so easily, that lead you astray.

It is a New Year which means for most people they will be setting New Year resolutions; I however have already set achievable goals. So have many other sixth form students. This year whilst setting my goals, I used a technique I was taught in my leadership skills class. The technique is known as a mission statement.

Step 1: Identify Past Successes. Spend some time identifying four or five examples where you have had personal success in recent years. These successes could be at school, in your community, at home, or elsewhere. Write them down.

My past successes that I wrote down were being one of the top students for Marian Academy CSEC results 2015, being able to volunteer at organizations, and being able to successfully keep up with my academic studies and receiving good work and good conduct badges. I try to be healthy through participating in extra curriculum activities. Lastly I was chosen to be Head Prefect. After identifying these areas, it is necessary to examine whether there are certain themes you followed to achieve success to those examples. Write them down.

The common theme in those successes was that I was focused on the task at hand and tried to be a leader not a follower. I had an opinion and voiced it respectfully. I always knew what had to be done and created a mental check list to complete my tasks and I never forced myself into pursuing activities that would cause me to feel overwhelmed.

Step 2: Identify Core Values. Develop a list of attributes that you believe identify who you are and what your priorities are. The list can be as long as you need. Identify five or six of the most important values.

The five core values I live by are honesty, responsibility, courage, integrity and team work. I believe that it is easier to be honest than create a lie. Therefore, I strive to be truthful because I could use the space in memory for something else. With great power comes great responsibility, so for every duty I have, I also have the responsibility to fulfil my duties. I will always need courage to fulfil my dreams and achieve my goals. I need to have the courage to take a stand for my beliefs and if I don't have the courage then I won't be able to achieve my goals and that will be my fault. Integrity knows what the right thing to do is and doing it. If you cannot do the right thing the persons will not want to be associated with you. Team work helps me to think on a larger scale, it inspires cooperation and a larger pool of ideas is available.

Ensure that I have a balanced life style, meaning I do exceptionally well in my academic performances, while keeping healthy and still being able to have leisure. I hope to become a better volunteer in non profit organizations and help those who have been rendered helpless. I will be participating in multiple school competitions and events.
